

Community Service Programs

As a member organization of the GFWC, the Wake Forest Woman's Club offers six Community Service Programs (CSPs) from which each member may choose to concentrate her time, talents, energy and creativity. The commitment is for a period of one year with a maximum of two years. Prior to the beginning of the club year in September, the chairman of your selected CSP will call all members of the committee together to discuss and finalize the projects that they as a group will carry out during the year. However, if you are interested in a project that another CSP is pursuing, you are always welcome to participate in that activity.

The six Community Service Programs as described in the 2016-2018 GFWC Club Manual are:



Arts encourages members to promote and support arts activities in all communities. It is designed to inspire clubwomen. Create programs and projects that include music, dance, drama, theatre and other arts-related areas, both traditional and innovative.

Conservation is designed for members to gain an appreciation for our environment. It strives to educate members about the importance of beautifying our communities; preserving, maintaining and restoring natural resources; and stimulating citizen action to address these concerns. Our natural resources include, but are not limited to, water, trees, plants, air, land and wildlife.



Education opens doors to a new life of opportunities for our youth as well as those returning to school, whether it is in a degree program or a self-improvement course. Our goal should be to assist others through higher education. Education can assist in the goal to end poverty, attain a better job, improve quality of life and create a better world.

Home Life is designed to inform members of issues that affect the well-being of individuals, families and communities. Clubs may develop and implement creative projects that promote a healthy lifestyle; increase awareness, prevention, research and treatment of disease; target personal development; address the issues of hunger, inadequate housing and homelessness; and/or prevent or correct financial difficulties.



International Outreach is designed to enable members to become better world citizens through advocacy, education and action, which will, in turn, effect change in and for our global friends and their communities. Consider raising cultural awareness; celebrating ethnicities; conducting fundraising activities to support healthy child development; advocating for basic human needs such as food, water, clothing and education; and promoting self-sufficiency.

Public Issues is designed to actively connect members with effective projects and activities relating to civic and social responsibilities. Consider projects that increase understanding about running for office; voter registration; elections; democracy; disaster preparedness; road safety; and supporting our military personnel.
